IN PARCELS DIVIDED BY THE SHEET EDGE, THE ACREAGES ARE SHOWN TO SHEET EDGE ONLY.

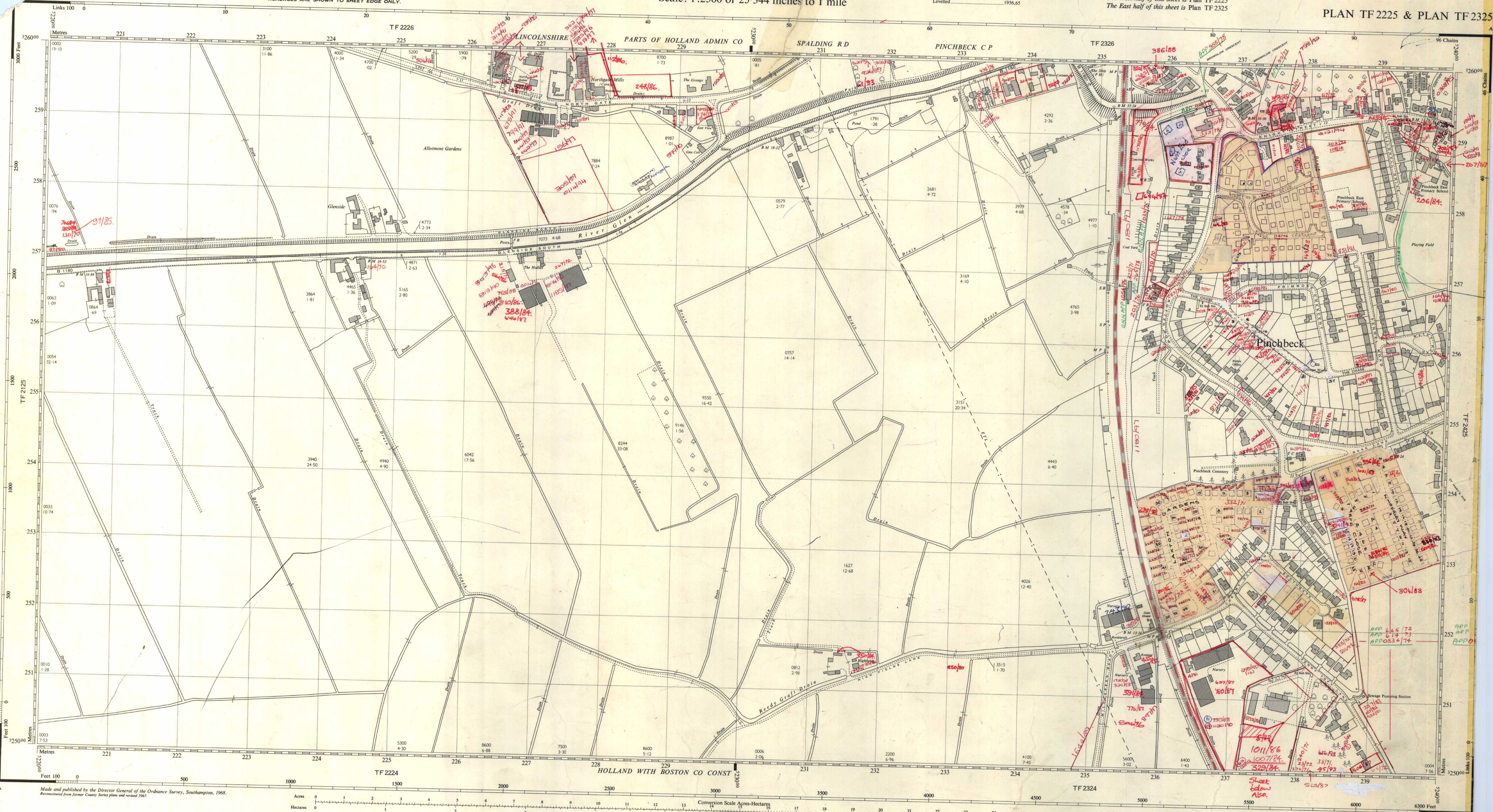

NATIONAL GRID REFERENCE
The lines on the plan form part of the National Grid and are spaced at 100 metre intervals.
To give a large scale reference defining the position of a point to the nearest 10 metres proceed as follows:-
EXAMPLE: G in Glenside
EASTING
Take west edge of square in which point lies and read the figures opposite this line on NORTH and SOUTH margins
224
Estimate tens of metres from the grid line
2240
NORTHING
Take south edge of square in which point lies and read the figures opposite this line on EAST and WEST margins
257
Estimate tens of metres from the grid line
2577
