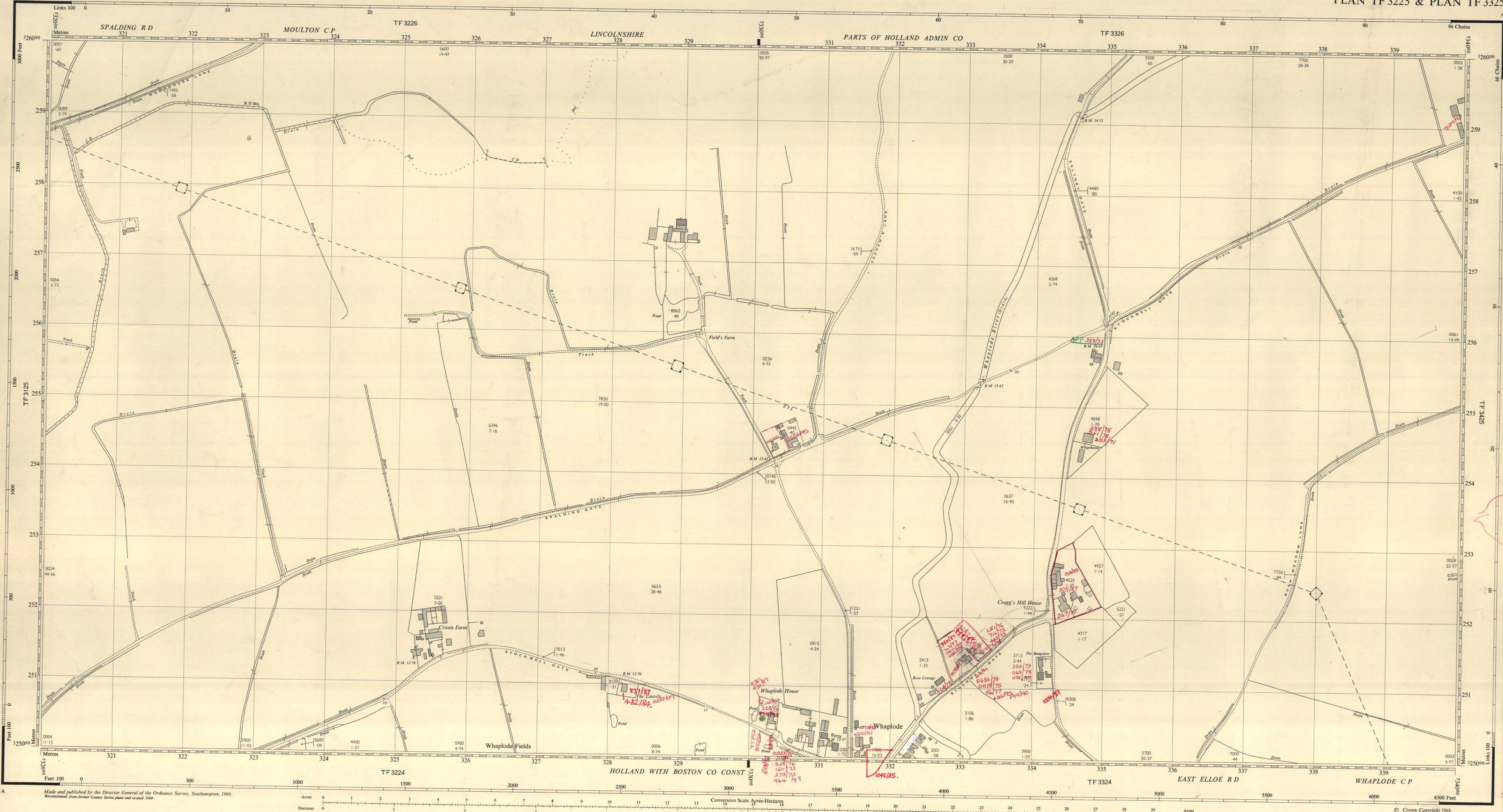

The lines on the plan form parts of the National Grid and are spaced at 100 metres intervals.			
To give a large scale reference defining the position of a point to the nearest 10 metres proceed as follows—			
EXAMPLE: C in Crag's Hill House			
EASTING		NORTHING	
Take west edge of square in which point lies and read the figures opposite this line on NORTH and SOUTH margins		Take south edge of square in which point lies and read the figures opposite this line on EAST and WEST margins
