NATIONAL GRID REFERENCE

The grid lines form a pair of the National Grid and are at 100 metre intervals. To give a unique reference the position of a point is written in 10 metres procedure as follows:-

	EXAMPLE from sheet TQ 05
1. Take the two letters preceding the sheet number	TQ
2. Take the west edge of the grid square in which the point lies and read the figures opposite the grid square on the south margin	09
3. Estimate tens of metres from the grid line to the point (distance <i>x</i>)	2
8 The resulting four figure number is the Easting	08
4. Take the south edge of the grid square in which the point lies and read the figures opposite this line on the east or west margin	5
5. Estimate tens of metres from the grid line to the point (distance <i>y</i>)	21
6 The resulting four figure number is the Northing	21
7. The full ten metre reference is given by writing first the letters, followed by the Easting figure and then the Northing figure	TQ 0821
